# Homeschool Portfolio

There are many ways to compile and present a homeschool portfolio. A portfolio is one of many ways to track and document a child's educational progress. A portfolio evaluation can be used to satisfy the annual evaluation requirement under New Hampshire Home Education Law (RSA 193-A:6 and Ed 315.07).

The contents of a homeschool portfolio may include (but need not be limited to) the following:

### I. Program Information

- A. Copy of acknowledged notification letter (See RSA 193-A:5 and Ed 315.04);
- B. Table of contents; and
- C. General summary

A brief, general summary written by the parent/guardian can be very helpful because it provides the evaluator with an overview of the home education program.

### II. Subject Summaries

#### A. Subject;

This is a brief summary of the progress observed, concepts learned, and skills mastered in each subject.

### B. Content; and

This is a brief overview of basic course content for each subject.

### C. Other

This section can offer information about self-designed curriculum, activities, projects, or extra work done in each subject.

## III. Work Samples

#### A. Samples of work;

Include examples of work spanning the school year to show what was accomplished.

#### B. Reading list;

*Include a list of books read.* 

# C. Field trips;

Provide information about field trips and other activities that were part of the homeschool program.

#### D. Other

Include photographs, ticket stubs, newspaper articles, or any materials that provide information about the homeschool program activities.

### IV. Evaluation Results

Once the evaluation is acceptable to the parent/guardian, the evaluator and then the parent/guardian should sign the results. The parent/guardian should retain a copy of the evaluation in his/her records. The evaluator may retain a copy of the evaluation if he/she wishes to do so.
